2. How incorporate these insights into our worship service or how we BE the church?

-Get a WPC Facebook account. Possibly use Facebook Live for hybrid service

-How make in-person more community oriented/see faces/participatory?

Some ideas to ponder (no decisions were made to do these things):

-Maybe first try doing worship in fellowship hall in a circle or at the tables so can see each other's faces. The Sanctuary is more meditative. Or could we make fellowship hall meditative?

Do we need Sound system, screen in Fellowship hall?

-Semicircle or circle rather than all facing forward?

-If we like it, then consider taking out pews and have moveable chairs?
